Vale - Ron Taylor

I feel very privileged having been asked to write something for the club magazine about Ron Taylor who passed away recently. With Ron's passing I have not only lost a good friend but the MG movement especially The Sydney MG Car Club have lost a friend.

I first bumped into Ron at a breakfast run in 1984, of which I remember very little, however over the years we got to know a man of great knowledge who was passionate about MG's amongst other things. I can list over a dozen cars he has restored over the past 40 odd years, however, most of you would have seen these and I will be telling you nothing new.

Ron is one of two people who have had a huge influence on the way I go about many tasks these days, with the Mantra "There is only one way to do it and that's the right way". I know it drives some people mad, but it is now so deeply ingrained that it comes naturally.

Ron was much more than just MG's. After being convinced by Lindy and Ron to move to the Central Coast to live in 1988, we watched Ron, the only person I know who had a 36-hour day, follow so many different passions apart from his cars.

We were invited on one occasion to come and taste Ron's Paella as he was doing "Spanish Cooking Lessons". If all the courses available were listed alphabetically, I would have thought he would have found something before he got to "S" but then it might have been listed as "Cooking – Spanish". At the same time, to add to his repertoire, he must have got down to "G" on the list and thought he should also learn to play the guitar. So, to add to the Paella night, the full Spanish theme was accomplished by Ron entertaining us with flamenco music (that may be an exaggeration) played on his acoustic guitar. Always the entertainer!

Aside from these studious pursuits, Ron also was on the Volunteer Coastal Patrol and raced outboard motors attached to a bit of fibreglass about the size of a thong. Now Ron was not what you would have called slightly built by any means and the first time I saw this sport it reminded me of bathtub racing on steroids. However, being a bit of a thrill seeker, Ron somehow managed to fit all this in.

One of Ron's favourite times of the year was National Meeting time. Ron would load up the Gosford Shoplifters Truck with the car of the year, stick the trailer on the back with a second car for Lindy and head off across this great wide land to wherever the MG fraternity was gathering.

We had the pleasure of spending quite a few of these with the Taylor clan. Some of the stories out of these can probably not be published until the statute of limitations expires around the turn of the next century, but a lot of great memories come to mind.

In Shepparton 1996, for whatever reason, we were in fancy dress with Ron going all out in a Blinky Bill suit. Later that night, we presented Jill Smith to the local patrolling Constabulary at which point she accused Blink Bill of molesting her. It was quite a sight to see Ron being dragged from the event by the police in handcuffs, but more disturbing, was the sight of the poor child outside who witnessed this and promptly burst into tears.

There are other stories of a night visit to Port Arthur at a Tassie Natmeet, where Ron, and some other unnamed friends, dressed in shower curtains from the motel, pretended to be ghosts and rolled marbles down the corridors to scare the unsuspecting, and very nervous, attendees. Needless to say, the prank worked very well and ended in the appropriate roars of laughter! Ron was never backward at dressing up for these events and somewhere ingrained in the back of my mind is the sight of Ron dressed as a Gorilla at one of the now notorious Double Decker Dinners. At an unplanned toilet break, between progressive dinner locations, Ron descending the stairs of a



double decker bus at full tilt and on hitting terra ferma, lost his footing and ended up face down in a swamp somewhere around the Northern Road. The smell was only slightly better improved by a hosing down, on very cold 10 deg winter night, on John & Fay Goodshaw's front lawn. The night ended with Ron taking the prize for best male costume and becoming the subject of many smelly photographs taken that night, much to the dread of Suzie, who won best ladies costume dressed as a genie, and many other hapless victims who got to cuddle the swamp monster. I do not know whether he got his deposit back on the costume and how poor Lindy coped with the smell once the party was over!

Ron and Natmeets sort of went hand in hand. Ron's truck moved the entire Sydney contingent to all the events with Ron being our "Deso" and got us there and back safely along with the odd souvenir he acquired along the way. Without naming the Club concerned (statute of limitations etc) Ron was running a little late to an event one night and happened to walk past a motel room whose curtains were not drawn. Well as luck would have it, they had also hung the club banner up in the window. Ron returned to reception and convinced the motel owner he had been sent back to pick it up. Ron one - XX car club zero.

I must admit the biggest prize we had to leave behind was a concrete dog weighing about half a tonne that Ron reckoned we needed to bring back on the 'Jazz Train' from the Loaded Dog pub at Tarago, at a function for the Canberra National Meeting. The dog wasn't the only thing that was loaded that night! Thankfully, it was going nowhere despite all efforts!

Ron was also a connoisseur of port and many stories can be told of evenings at Car Club events being finished with a drop or two or three! I must admit I have not drunk port since a trip back from the Brisbane Natmeet, where we spent the night with Ron and Lindy in Byron Bay eating prawns and drinking port.

We were very lucky to spend a day with Ron and Lindy recently and even though we had not spent a lot of time with them since we moved north, we just continued the conversations from where we left off, we laughed our heads off at some of the things we had seen and done, talked about the wonderful times we had and all drawn together by a mutual love for The Marque. Had it not been for MG's we might never have met Ron and Lindy and that would have been a sad thing. Ron brought a sparkle to everything he did whether it was helping someone with a car, organising the "Tours" with Robert Smith or just participating in club events.

Ron was a great friend to us as he was to so many. His passing will leave a hole not only in our lives but in the entire MG movement.

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

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MGB Musings

MGB FRONT WHEEL BEARING END FLOAT

Ever since I replaced the wire wheels on the BGT it has tracked true and vibration free. However coming back on the freeway from the funeral procession for Ron Taylor I noticed a very slight vibration coming through the steering wheel. Hmm I thought I might need to get the wheels balanced.

Now I am the sort of person that notices every rattle, squeak and vibration, and a short while later I heard a very soft rotating metal on metal sound. When applying the brakes it didn't go away nor get any worse. So not the brakes, this needs further investigation.

My initial thought was that it might be a wheel bearing, although I had replaced the front wheel bearings not too long ago. To check the wheel bearings, the first thing to do is to check for excessive play at the wheel. To do this jack up the front of the car and put axle stands under the side rails to ensure it is securely off the ground. Grab each side of the wheel and move it back and forwards. An MGB is supposed to have between 0.002 inches and 0.004 inches of movement, called end-float, in the hub to ensure the bearings don't bind. This is not very much, but noticeable. If you can feel the wheel move more than a little bit it means there is too much end float and it warrants further investigation. In my case it did move, just a bit too much for my liking.



To get to the wheel bearings you need to remove the front hub. This is held in place by a large castelated nut with a split pin through it (see photo). Sitting over the top of these is a grease retaining cap. I noticed that the cap was at the end of the hub rather than sitting over the nut, and when I

removed it and peered inside the hub I saw what I think was the cause of the rotating metal on metal sound. One of the ends of the split pin was touching the inside of the hub. To be honest, I am surprised I heard this, but it had worn a slight groove on the inside of the hub. However, this did not explain the movement. With the hub off and disassembled, a close inspection of the bearings showed they were in perfect condition and had been surrounded by plenty of grease. Maybe there was a problem with setting the end float when I replaced the bearings not long ago. There was nothing to do but reset the end float.

The end float is set by shims which sit between the roller (outer) bearing and the large bearing spacer. These come in 3 sizes 0.003, 0.005 and 0.010 inches. If you read the BMC / Leyland workshop manual it says you add enough shims until you get excessive end float. Measure the end float with a clock or dial gauge and then remove

the required combination of shims to get between the 0.002 inches and 0.004 inches end float specified. The problem is I don't have a dial gauge and I doubt many home mechanics do. Instead, what you do is to assemble the hub and bearings with enough shims that it rotates freely when



tightened to the specified torque. Then progressively remove enough shims until, when it is reassembled and tightened again, the hub starts to bind when rotated. This is the point at which the end float is zero. Then you add a 0.003 inch shim and the end float will be between the specified 0.002 and 0.004 inches.

Sounds easy enough, and indeed it is not actually difficult, but it is frustrating and time consuming to disassemble the hub, fish out the shims that are there, add or take away shims of various sizes, reassemble and tighten again until you get the correct end float. On the passenger side I must have done it 8 or 9 times, but got lucky on the driver's side and it only took me 3 or 4. It is also dirty work as you are working in grease.

I am still at a bit of a loss as to why there was too much play so soon after I had installed the new bearings. A possible explanation I have come across is that the other bearing in the hub – the inner bearing, which has to be drifted down inside the hub when installed may not have been pushed all the way home. Remember that we are only talking about a couple of 'thou', so it is possible. To help avoid this when putting new bearings in you should tighten the whole thing up without any shims before starting to set the end float.

Anyway, when I took it for a test drive there was no metal on metal sound nor undue vibration. But I will jack the car up and check for movement in a week or 2 once I have put a few more miles up and things have settled again.

I should mention that I also checked the rear wheel bearings, and fortunately there was hardly any movement there. And I also inspected for any wear and movement in the suspension bushes and king pins. Doing that is a story for another day.







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Boot Floor Trouble

I'd long regretted carpeting the boot in my MGB, in 1985, but with its bare painted floor, articles being carried in the boot were forever scratching and marking the painted surfaces. It just never looked tidy, always deteriorated and "unfinished".

So, 35 years later, I finally got around to taking the carpet out again.





Initially, things didn't look too bad! Just a lot of hard rubbing, leaning over into awkward angles. BUT. around the



BUT, around the fuel filler, clearly things weren't so happy. Much rust, which looked like surface rust predominantly. But also emerging were former patch repairs (x2) to the boot floor, and, as you can see in the photo with the screw driver pointing, some small perforations appeared in areas well away from where corrosive and rust

promoting fluids had collected in the off-side rear quarter recesses.

One significant disadvantage of having to go to work was my not being home when the soda blaster came. He had assured me that he could protect the surrounding paint and only blast in the boot. Nonetheless I carefully masked off around and inside the boot carefully, including boot lid hinges, prop, wiring harness and filler neck. I also masked around the perimeter of the vertical panel separating the cabin from the boot to stop the dust getting in to the cabin. To mask inside the cabin, I removed the parcel shelf carpet. Unfortunately it would seem the this was interpreted by the soda blaster as me asking for the parcel shelf to be blasted, which was entirely unnecessary. The result was a cabin with dust everywhere! In some places there actual piles of sodium bicarbonate a centimetre and more high, and in many places forced into narrow inaccessible crevices.







Small pinholes, and more than just pinholes (!!) and not unfortunately not localized to just one area. Things are looking more serious! The last photo is of some of the foam I extracted, placed on each side between the corner boot floor panels behind each wheel arch on the sides and the inner surface of the mudguard, still there from when



the car was first assembled in Enfield, Sydney, at Pressed Metal Corporation, in September 1965. It was all still in there, intact and complete, and, remarkably, utterly dry.









The main section of the boot floor is next. The reproduction panel had serious discrepancies from the original. The panel now sourced from British Motor Heritage is better, but is roughly produced, poorly finished and still shows differences from the original, which will unfortunately need further time consuming attention by the artisan Robert. Another discovery from taking out the boot carpet was that the wiring harness had been cut into, spliced and wrapped in PVC tape. I have no idea when this happened, by who, nor even why. The car had been rewired in 2006, using a brand new cloth-wrapped wiring harness. So it was fortunate that a new unused early MGB rear harness came up for sale recently at a reasonable price.





And poor Robert got into all this by having very kindly offered to repaint the interior of my boot in readiness for my upcoming Easter road trip in my MGB to Wodonga!

He may understandably be reluctant to ever again help me with a seemingly small task on one of my MGs again. The Wodonga trip has since been cancelled. Hmm...Robert, I'd love my MGA to be Katoomba Grey again! :-D

Tom and Robert's problem solving and finishing touches

Reproduction items for our MGs are repeatedly poorly done. The people giving the go-ahead for these parts clearly are inattentive to important details, time and again. A good example is my present need to source a new boot floor for my MGB.

In particular, look at the swage pressings reinforcing the front lower corner that runs across this section of the floor in the original. Then look at the half hearted purely cosmetic impressions made in the reproduction floor in an attempt to look, at a glance, similar to the original.

Those swages are there for a reason, to stiffen that folded line in the panel. Without them, with a load in the boot, even the weight of the spare and the fuel tank, which is bolted to the underside of the boot floor, would cause the floor to go up down as the car travels over every day bumps in the road. Apart from noise, ultimately a metal fatigue fracture would almost certainly ultimately result along this fold in the panel.

Also compare the mounting for the spare wheel/tyre. The original has a raised star shaped form, integrated with a substantial circular plate which is welded to the boot floor. The reproduction floor just has a copy of the raised star formation. Again the strength of the configuration in the reproduction boot floor is significantly compromised. 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
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Tom's New Toys

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




