The MG Car Club welcomes back Gillian Lewis from the National Maritime Museum. Sydney. Gillian joined the Australian National Maritime Museum as a volunteer guide in 2008 when she retired from a successful sales career in commercial building at CSR Building Products. She has also been a member of the ANMM Speakers for past 8 years developing several presentations and regularly speaking to community groups. She and her husband own a 1972 Jensen Interceptor III and 1953 MG TD . They active in several car clubs regularly driving the cars on outings.

Gillian comes from a family with a history in the merchant and Royal Australian Navies. She has a special interest in the loss with all hands of HMAS Sydney (II) in November 1941 after a battle with the German raider HSK Kormoran and volunteered her time for several years to search genealogical data bases for living relatives of Sydney crew to be DNA to assist in identifying the unknown serviceman from the ship. She is also interested in WW1 history, particularly the Western front theatre of war.

On this occasion Gillian will talk about the "Mutiny on the Bounty" and the incredible open boat voyage that followed.

What led to the mutiny and how Captain Bligh and his 18 supporter survived one of the greatest feats of survival and endurance in modern history.

Last year when Gillian spoke about the submarine attack on Sydney harbour, you may recall that you could have heard a "pin drop" in the room. This talk I'm sure will hold us equally spellbound. Greg Fereday

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The MG National Meeting - Adelaide 2023. Day 3

Easter Sunday. I love Motorkhana and other timed speed events but, being so far from home, I was reluctant to push the envelope on the A, so Sue and I opted for the more leisurely Kimber run which took 100 or so cars on up into the beautiful Adelaide Hills. We stopped at the famous Mount Lofty lookout before heading onto Hahndorf for lunch at the home of Hahndorf AFL Magpies. A free afternoon to explore the shops there as well has other attractions including Hans Heysens home and studio, Berensdorf and a car museum. 'Top Down', we took a different route home through Norton summit and had an exhilarating drive home on 'twisties' just made for MG's. The Motorkahna was held at the front of the Tailem Bend race track, simply called 'The Bend'. This facility makes Eastern Creek look a bit like old Amaroo.

You can access the race track itself by first going through a 5 star hotel with a foyer to die for. Decorated with various rare and notable machines that are pretty much all 'unobtainable'. A Bugatti Chiron Super Sport 300: One of 30, 1600 bhp and a top speed of 490 kmh. Yours for \$5 million. A Porsche 918 Spyder: 0 to 100 kmh in 2.6 seconds. Yours for \$2 million. A McLaren P1 GTR, 1400 kgs and 1000 bhp. A D-Type, an exquisite E-Type, Jamie Whincups' Bathurst winning Commodore VE II and more !. Take the left turn just past the Lamborghini Gallardo to go out

Easter Sunday. For the Kimber Run was overcast and threatening to rain when we assembled at the Marion Fitness and Leisure Centre car park. Entrants were to arrive from 8.15am to sign on and collect their fun bag with route instruction book, car plaque and other items. Tea and coffee were available on site. The driver safety briefing took place at 9.45am and the cars departed at 10.00am ushered out onto the road making sure everyone left safely by volunteers from the SA MG Car Club.

First stop after negotiating the narrow and windy road taking care not to come in contact with the many cyclists was at the summit of Mount Lofty. As I mentioned the roads are very narrow and there are no cycle lanes so overtaking these cyclists was hazardous.

The view was of the whole of Adelaide extending out to the waters of the Gulf of St.



onto the viewing deck to take in the fabulous 7.7 km track below. There were 3 Motorkhana courses which were very challenging. A gifted navigator or a fast talking Siri would be helpful. But they worked and it was a popular and very successfully run event by all accounts. I think Motorkhanas are something we should still strive to do more of as a club in NSW. No taxi required. A full blown 'Noggin and Natter' followed a great home cooked meal with salad which Hilary piled onto our plates.

Next stop after 31 klms was for coffee was at Uraidla and I think everyone and their dog had the same idea as it was about morning tea time. The most popular cafe had a line out to the door so we opted for a smaller one further down the street which saved a lot of time.

After 92 klms we drove into Hahndorf and onto the Hahndorf Oval Complex where Marshals directed us to the parking area. Day 4. Easter Monday. Speed Event .Tailem Bend

Following three days of showery weather across Adelaide for the 2023 National meeting, Monday opened as a fine day for MG sports cars to head to Tailem Bend and the Bend Motorsport Park, home to the FIA accredited motor racing circuit. Opened in January 2018, it is the world's second longest permanent circuit at 7.77km which can be used in four different configurations. The MG Speed Event was held on the West circuit at 3.4km with 12 turns.



Three of the NSW Club Members set off from Adelaide on Monday morning to cover the 100 km drive to The Bend to be in position to have our cars in position for the Driver's Briefing at 8.30am:

Warwick Protheroe in his MGBL roadster, Alan Heritage in his MGC GT and Stuart Ratcliff in his MGZT 260.

The event was run as Super Sprint style event with the approximately 80 entrants divided into 5 Groups; about 16 competitors on track at one time with some speed differentials! Each Group had three sessions for 15 minutes.







The circuit turned out to be a mixture of long, fast straights with 12 turns with a couple of daunting hairpins. And so it was a case of watching your mirrors and hard on the brakes! Several cars were seen launching into the dirt runoff areas. One of our members had some fun playing with traction control and having 3 offs to study the South Australian native grasses!



Despite that, we ended up with three Class medals .. a First for the MGC, a Second for the ZT and a third for the MGB.

Very memorable was watching the Pre-war cars circulating at 100% and Tony Vollebregt from Victoria picking up the fastest time of the day in his MG Super Special. The display of some amazing cars in the elegant Pit café was a sight to behold.



Day 4. Easter Monday. Observation Run

The 2023 Nat Meet Observation Run was thrown into disarray due to Motor Sport Australia's decision to change Licensing requirements for entrants in these type of events, on previous occasions a limited licence was available and could be purchased at the event, not so this year where only a yearly license was valid and needed to be organized prior to the Meeting so the Adelaide Committee added a social tour to run in conjunction with the a social tour to run in conjunction with the official run over the same course with the question element deleted.

A 40-minute drive from our Motel to the starting point at Thorndon Park Reserve where a drivers meeting heralded the start of a great drive through the Adelaide Hills where the Autumn leaves were splendid in their orange and gold hues.



Thẹ run concluded at the Lobethal Bierhaus (which I believe is operated by a member of the Adelaide MG Club) an Aussie version of a German Beer Hall where lunch was served washed down with the local beverage (one only) however many of us purchased a 2 litre flagon of Pilsner which has the added advantage if we return they will refill it for \$20

The Bierhaus web site had noted that the dining area

would be closed for our visit while our cars would be displayed outside, the T Types were segregated from the others they looked superb parked adjacent to the old building.

Of interest the 1939 Australian Grand Prix was run on public roads starting in Lobethal competing 17 laps of a14 km track the first time the event had been run on sealed roads with an MG being declared the winner.

Those of the Sydney MG Club who were license compliant were confident of a strong result with Granville Harris & Ivanna being the current champions with high hopes of back-to-back wins however it was not to be with Robert & Jill Smith claiming 2nd and Granville & Ivanna 4th.

Hopefully the license problem will be overcome by next Easter so we can all compete in this great event in Tamworth.

A lot of Medals were handed out with NSW making a good showing. I recall we were about 5th out of the 17 MG clubs in attendance for the overall John Wratten Memorial Trophy. Our result was bouyed by a steady performance across all events and a favourable handicap for the distance we had travelled.

Another great night finishing off a great weekend before a farewell breakfast.

We planned to make the home to Sydney over 3 days instead of 2, returning via Mildura and Narrandera. As with the best laid plans we ceased to proceed 2 kms from Mildura as it was getting dark. A failed Distributor shaft (which was beyond repair) meant an NRMA tow job and an extra day in Mildura.

100 Years of MG - Part 1 continued

100 YEARS OF MG

One of the premises William Morris obtained when he took over the assets of Collins and Company (who were engineers and horse drawn carriage builders) was a stable yard in Alfred Lane. After this had been cleared of rubbish and the roof repaired, Kimber thought it would be an ideal location for working on the cars that Morris Garages were completing with their own bodywork. He set up a workshop in a small shed in the yard, and to get things underway transferred Cecil Cousins and an assistant there. All the Morris Garages cars received careful attention before going to customers, while the standard Morris models they sold also had their pre-delivery checks carried out here before going to their new owners.





Clarendon Yard was rebuilt and turned into a covered area for storing/repairing cars. Petrol pumps were installed and used to fill the tanks of cars ready for collection. A sign on the back wall encourages people to buy British.

his father wanted the balance of the compensation money for the business. Cecil would not agree to this and resigned. The pair parted on bad terms, and for the rest of his life Henry would not even speak to his son.

Obviously then needing a job, Kimber joined Sheffield-Simplex as personal assistant to their Chief Engineer. He and Rene married in 1915, and the following year the family moved to Surrey when Kimber took up a post as buyer for AC Cars in Thames Ditton, with Rene as his secretary. He then moved to Birmingham in 1918 to join E.G. Wrigley Limited, a company that supplied numerous components to Morris and others. After the fighting stopped in 1918, this factory was one of the suppliers to a new venture set up to build a car called the Angus Sanderson. It is possible that Kimber may have had money in that enterprise. When it later failed, William Morris purchased the assets from the liquidator. It was during Kimber's time at E.G. Wrigley that Morris probably met him, and must have been impressed enough to offer him that job at Morris Garages in 1921. This was a business separate from the car building Morris Motors, and unlike that company was still owned solely by William Morris.

The Morris Garages staff under Edward Armstead in the Queen Street, Oxford showroom prior to Kimber's arrival consisted of two drivers for the car hire side of the business, one of whom could help out the full-time salesman when needed. There was also a man dealing with counter sales of parts, plus one lady who manned the switchboard and another who was the secretary. Around the corner from the showroom was a yard behind the Clarendon Hotel that Morris took over to use as workshops. Here one of the mechanics in the section dealing with motorcycle repairs was Cecil Cousins,

who would later play a vital role in the MG story. Another man who went on to be the brains behind so many of the record-breaking achievements and new road cars was Albert Sydney (Syd) Enever. Taken on aged 14 as the odd-job boy, Syd spent his first year cleaning and moving cars in the showroom as well as riding a bicycle fitted with a basket and Morris Garages signs to take messages and small parts between the Morris Garages premises, and also to and from the Morris factory at Cowley. After this, he was moved into the workshop to train as a mechanic. When he was 16, Enever was taught to drive and used an old Morris Cowley to collect parts. This was later fitted with a van body painted with Morris Garages signage and used to move parts between premises.

In March 1922 Edward Armstead resigned and a temporary replacement was put in place. As his permanent replacement, Morris appointed Cecil Kimber, who he thought had the energy and enthusiasm needed for the job. All the necessary people to see the start of the MG margue were now in place.

As this was a difficult time for sales, Kimber attempted to widen their market by offering cars that were not readily available from other dealers. A Morris Cowley chassis was modified to lower the tail, and a two-seater body with space in the back for occasional passengers was built by Carbodies of 'Kimber attempted to widen their market by offering cars that were not readily available from other dealers'

Coventry. Called the Chummy, it proved popular despite a relatively high price, until torpedoed by the introduction of a similar but far cheaper model from Morris Motors in late 1923.

By then, Kimber had already moved the game on by having six Morris Cowley chassis modified in the usual way and then given sporty twoseater bodywork made by the local coachbuilder, Raworth. These are generally recognised as the first true MGs, the very first one being sold to an Oliver Arkell in August 1923 and registered on the 16th of that month. At £350 the Raworth-bodied car was expensive though, and it took nearly a year to sell all six. Kimber saw that to sell cars already fitted with their coachwork, they needed to add exclusive features like improved performance. Special badging could also help, and it is significant that the MG octagon was in an advert in the November 1923 issue of The Isis magazine for the Morris Garages Super Sports models announced late in 1923 for sale in 1924, although it had first been used in a Morris Garages advert back in March 1923. This undoubtedly signalled the start of MG as a distinct brand. We can only speculate as to whether either Cecil Kimber or William Morris foresaw quite how MG would grow, but we will move on to cover the early years of that growth in part two of our series next month.

100 th Anniversary of Citroen

You're likely unaware that this year is the 100th anniversary of Citroën.

While doing some research I happened to stumble upon a fascinating bit of wartime Citroën lore.

It involves tricking the Nazis in a genuinely clever and subtle way that nevertheless had big repercussions.



I'll explain: When France was occupied by the Germans in 1940, major French factories like Citroën were forced to produce equipment for the Nazis.

Citroën president Pierre-Jules Boulanger knew he couldn't just refuse to produce anything, but he also knew there's no way in hell he's going to just roll over and build trucks for the Nazis. Pierre had a plan.

John Reynold's book Citroën 2CV describes

Boulanger's sabotage efforts.

Of course, he instructed workers to set a nice, leisurely pace when building trucks likely Citroën T45 trucks,for the Wehrmacht, but that's fairly obvious.



What was brilliant was

Boulanger's idea to move the little notch on the trucks' oil dipsticks that indicated the proper level of oil down just a bit lower. By moving the notch down, the trucks would not have enough oil, but German mechanics would have no idea, because, the little notch on the dipstick says it's just fine.

Then, after the truck has been used for a while, and is out deployed somewhere crucial, whammo, the engine seizes up, and you've got a lot of angry, stranded, vulnerable Nazis, balling up their little fists and madly barking curses in German.

It's such a fantastic act of sabotage: it's extremely cheap to implement, it's subtle, there's no way to see something amiss is happening as the trucks are being built, and it delivers its blow away from the site of the sabotage and when it will cause the most inconvenience and trouble.

That's some mighty good sabotaging, Pierre. Happy 100th Anniversary, Citroën.
